TO VACCINATE OR NOT TO VACCINATE?

In the weeks ahead or even less time than that many of us will be faced with this question. Not only to be vaccinated but to realize that we must have two shots. Many influential people have been touting the need to vaccinate. Mr. Biden, president-elect, Vice President Pence, and members of the federal coronavirus panel have shown the ease of receiving a shot that is "life-saving" and pandemic destroying.

The epistle that everyone cried in their 2020 Christmas cards was "What a year" or "Let's hope for a return to normal". It appears that the quickest way to become "normal" (remember when that wasn't a desirable state) is to vaccinate.

Currently there are two different vaccines available. One is produced by Pfizer and the other is from Moderna. It isn't that we have a choice but rather here is what you get. However, the "getting it" is the help needed to overcome the worse medical calamity of our lifetime.

As you ponder your decision to vaccinate or not consider the following information that is provided through several various sources from the internet, local physicians, scientists and most everyone.

The vaccine will help you and the people you care for, work with and encounter in everyday life be safer. 

take advantage of every nice day outside that they could!


